Happy Valentines! Spring is just around the corner. This month's issue will be a highlight of our Fort Apache Connection ("FAC") Transit program. Fort Apache Connection Transit began back in 2017 where we started off with two drivers and only two routes. DOT is proud of how the transit program has progressed, which now has five drivers and five routes in service. We plan to expand our transit program and continue adding more routes. Future routes include, Cibecue to Show Low and Hon-Dah to Holbrook, which would be on a monthly basis.

All transit rides are still free due to the CARES Act funds received back in 2021. So, I encourage all Tribal Members to take advantage and ride the bus. I would also like to acknowledge our FAC transit drivers who do their daily requirements of pre and post bus trips inspections; Keeping all transit buses clean and sanitary at the end of the day; and making sure all passengers are comfortable and reach their destination safely.

Division of Transportation has recently hired another driver and is offering one more transit driver position. You can apply at our Tribal Human Resources Office. The last day to apply is March 15, 2024. INFORMATION & SERVICES

- The FAC Transit currently operates three bus routes;
 - Route 1,
 - Route 2 and,
 - Route 3
- The FAC Transit has a seasonal connector route with San Carlos Apache Tribe to meet at Seneca.
- The FAC Transit will pick up and drop off passengers at designated bus stop locations from Monday to Friday.
- The FAC Transit will deviate off the three routes, UP TO 3/4 of a mile Monday to Friday. Must call ahead of scheduled time.
- You can connect with the Four Seasons Connection at Hon-Dah Store. All transit buses are wheelchair accessible and operated in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- NO ALCOHOL OR DRUGS are allowed on the transit bus. If you are intoxicated you will be denied a ride.

ROUTE 12 CIBECUE ROAD RAISE GRANT APPLICATION

Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) Grant Program, provides a unique opportunity for USDOT to invest in road, rail, transit and port projects that promise to achieve national objectives. Since 2009, Congress has dedicated nearly \$12.1 billion for fourteen rounds of National Infrastructure Investments to fund projects that have a significant local or regional impact. In 2023, RAISE awarded 162 projects across 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Northern Mariana Islands.

The WMAT DOT has submitted an application three times for Route 12 Cibecue Road to widen and reconstruct 14.7 miles, from Cibecue Junction to the end of pavement, by the school. The design of the project is complete, we will need \$50,699,908.85 to complete the construction. We scored in the higher levels but have still not been awarded. We submitted our fourth application, it was due February 28, 2024.



WHAT MAKES A GOOD RAISE GRANT APPLICATION?

What goes into submitting an application for a project this big?

1. Clear and Concise Proposal

A clear outline of your project or program.

2. Alignment with Funders Priorities

Show how your project fits within funders mission and goals.

3. Strong Impact Statement

Clearly articulate how the grant funding will make a difference and bring positive change.

4. Budget and Financials

Ensure that your budget is realistic, transparent, and aligns with the proposed activities.

5. Evidence- Based Approach / Crash Data

Support your proposal with date, research and evidence that demonstrate the need for your project. Accurate and up to date crash data provided by the White Mountain Tribal Police Department is critical.

6. Partnerships and Collaborations

Highlight any partnerships or collaborations that strengthen your project and demonstrate community support. Support letters from schools, Tribal Council, Counties, etc.

7. Evaluation Plan

Include a robust evaluation plan that outlines how you will measure the success of your project and track outcomes.

8. Compelling Narrative

Craft a compelling and engaging narrative that captures the attention of the reviewers. Using storytelling techniques to convey your projects importance.

9. Lobbying in Washington D.C

Tribal Council assistance in lobbying for the Project in Washington, D.C.

CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY

Transit Currently only has booster seats available for child passengers.



Booster seat raises child so seat belt fits correctly

Raises and positions a child so the vehicle's lap-and-shoulder belt fits properly over the stronger points of a child's body, the hips and across the chest.

Types

Booster Seat With High Back: This type of booster seat is designed to boost the child's height so the seat belt fits properly. It also provides neck and head support and is ideal for vehicles that don't have head rests or high seat backs.

Backless Booster Seat: A backless booster seat is designed to boost the child's height so the seat belt fits properly. It does not provide head and neck support. It is ideal for vehicles that have head rests

Combination Seat: As a child grows, this seat transitions from a forward-facing seat with a harness into a booster.

All-in-One Seat: This seat can change from a rear-facing seat to a forward-facing seat (with a harness and tether) and to a booster seat as a child grows.

WMAT DOT FUNDING Q&A

HOW IS WMAT DOT FUNDED?

WMAT DOT receives its funding from the Highway Trust Fund. This funding is allocated to tribes, and then dispersed through the United States Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration, Office of Tribal Transportation and the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Funds are allocated among Tribes using a formula based on tribal population, road mileage and average tribal shares of the former Tribal Transportation Allocation Methodology (TTAM) formula

HOW CAN WMAT DOT USE THESE FUNDS?

All Tribal Transportation Program (TTP) funds provided to Tribes can be expended only on eligible projects and activities identified in the federal regulations and included in an FHWA approved Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). Funds can be used for the following:

- Transportation planning, research, maintenance, engineering, rehabilitation, restoration, construction, and reconstruction of tribal transportation facilities
- Operation and maintenance of transit programs and facilities that are located on, or provide access to, tribal land, or are administered by a tribal government
- Any transportation project eligible for assistance under this title that is located within, or that provides access to, tribal land, or is associated with a tribal government

WMAT DOT prepares the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), a 5-year plan for improvements on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation. Each project on the TIP is supported by tribal resolution. WMAT DOT submits the TIP to the BIA Division of Transportation (BIADOT) for review and approval. BIADOT reviews, approves, and forwards the TIP to FHWA Federal Lands Highway Office (FLHO) for approval. WMAT DOT can allocate TTP funds for its projects once the TIP is approved by FHWA.

WHAT IS THE TTP?

The Tribal Transportation Program (TTP) is the largest program in the Office of Federal Lands Highway. Established in 23 U.S.C. 202 to address the transportation needs of Tribal governments throughout the United States, the program will receive \$505 million in FY 2020, as established in Public Law 114-94, Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (the FAST Act). The purpose of the TTP is to provide safe and adequate transportation and public road access to and within Indian reservations, Indian lands, and Alaska Native Village communities. A prime objective of the TTP is to contribute to the economic development, self-determination, and employment of Indians and Native Americans. The Tribal Transportation Program is funded by contract authority from the Highway Trust Fund and is subject to the overall Federal-aid obligation limitation.
